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INTRODUCTION

Australia's involvement in World War One began on 4 August 1914. Many who joined up believed that the war would be a great adventure, but none could have imagined the scale of the endeavour on which they were about to embark. Sadly, many of these soldiers, sailors, airmen, medical support staff and nurses didn't make it home. Their courage, sacrifice, hardship and losses brought a new maturity to our nation. In the face of atrocity and adversary, this publication recounts some of the survival stories of the men who enlisted and ultimately returned home.

The impact of World War One on Australia's economy was significant. At that time, the majority of exports from Australia were wool, wheat and minerals. Exporters were deprived of shipping services and they found it difficult to receive payments for their goods.

For Australia, the World War One remains the costliest conflict in terms of deaths and casualties. From a population of fewer than five million, 416,809 men enlisted, of whom more than 60,000 were killed and 156,000 were wounded, gassed, or taken prisoner. Another 6000 veterans died by the 1930s due to war related injuries and suicide.

The First World War and those involved with the conflict are often remembered through a variety of monuments ranging from statues to plaques. Honour rolls are a common example of such commemorative. These rolls are distinguished by their form, as they are mostly wooden, stone or bronze and feature a list of names underneath a crest. Honour rolls; commemorate specific individuals who belonged to a particular organisation. These include employees of a company, students at a school, members of a club or in the case of local council honour rolls, councillors and even mayors who participated in the conflict.

The team in Research Services have prepared and posted hundreds of biographical stories and accounts of events which relate to the actions of Parramatta servicemen and women during World War One.

We hope you enjoy reading about these amazing people and the terrifying and sometimes awe inspiring events which carried them across the globe to fight against Germany and her allies.

While the Research and Collections Team at the Parramatta Heritage Centre has been researching World War One servicemen, servicewomen and volunteer organisations, we have uncovered a number of key dates which relate to Parramatta. Some cover broader events of the war, but we also decided to include dates that were very specific to Parramatta at home and abroad, as well as dates which relate to the broader demographic of the current local government area.

Some relate to the actions of army and naval units in which the soldiers or nurses from Parramatta served. Some to the heroic endeavors of individuals while others have been included to mark an individual's contribution. Furthermore, it should continue to provide food for thought as we highlight the contribution of Parramatta and surrounding district's to this major world event.

World War One: Honour Rolls

The First World War (1914-1918) and those involved with the conflict, are often remembered through a variety of monuments ranging from statues to plaques. Honour rolls are a common example of such commemorative objects and can frequently be found in schools, government buildings or public areas. These rolls are distinguished by their form as they are mostly wooden, stone or bronze and feature a list of names underneath a crest.

Honour rolls, unlike other Great War memorials, were erected to commemorate specific individuals who belonged to a particular organisation. These include employees of a company, students at a school, members of a club or in the case of local council honour rolls, councillors and even mayors who participated in the conflict.

In addition to commemoration, honour rolls often serve other purposes as well depending on their decoration. Rolls created during the early twentieth century in particular, include references to the reigning monarch through symbolic imagery such as a crown or flag, or through a particular phrase, most commonly "For King and Country". This serves to reinforce both the organisation and the individuals'

patriotism or dedication to their nation. Furthermore, many rolls are furnished with symbols such as a wreath or olive branch to connote peace, signifying the end of war. Occasionally allusions to religion would be featured as well depending on the organisation.

Today, honour rolls continue to commemorate individuals who participated in the Great War as well as to serve as a reminder of the sacrifices made during wartime. Honour rolls also play a pivotal part in many remembrance ceremonies and are often displayed during events dedicated to armed forces such as ANZAC or Remembrance Day.

The individuals listed on honour rolls are remembered for their involvement in a particular conflict but may not be limited to those who died during active service. Some rolls specifically list their contributions with phrases such as "in commemoration of officers and employees who served" or "those who answered the call". Rolls may also specify those who have died during conflict or mark the military rank of certain individuals.

Commemorative rolls however, such as the one at the Australian War Memorial, are dedicated to Australians who have sacrificed their lives for a particular conflict in a non-military capacity. Though most names listed on honour rolls dedicated to military conflict are of individuals who fought or died in war, it is ultimately up to the organisation's discretion to determine who is eligible to be included and thus, eligibility can vary from roll to roll.

Similarly, the size, shape and structure of an honour roll varies and is dependent on the organisation that commissioned it. Larger organisations were able to fund more elaborate and furnished rolls, often to reinforce their dedication to their members and country.

Notable examples of these large honour rolls include the Australian War Memorial's Roll of Honour in the Australian Capital Territory which bears over a hundred thousand names spanning several conflicts beginning with Sudan in 1885. In Sydney, state-wide government organisations such as the Department of Education have erected large rolls of honour at their headquarters in remembrance of the New South Wales public school teachers involved in World War 1. Underneath Central Station in Sydney, another large honour roll dedicated to employees and members who served during the Great War is publicly displayed.

Honour rolls remain an integral aspect of Great War remembrance and can provide individual recognition to combatants who are often overlooked by generalised statues or monuments. They serve as a continual reminder of the costs of war, whilst ensuring that the sacrifices made remain in our memories.

Roll of Honour – Municipality of Dundas

In mid-2019, the City of Parramatta Council received a grant through the Department of Veterans' Affairs *Saluting Their Service Commemorations Program* (GA44126). This enable a Roll of Honour board that was in Council's cultural collection to be cleaned and restored to its former glory (see Figure 2).

As part of the grant, the project involved researching the 141 name plates featured on the board. These names reflect the service personnel 'who answered the call' between 1914 and 1919. Men who predominantly hailed from the Municipality of Dundas (1889-1949) which at the time included the suburbs of Carlingford, Dundas, Epping, Eastwood. Also included were names from neighbouring suburbs like Auburn, Ermington, Flemington, Granville, Homebush, Lidcombe, Merrylands, Parramatta and Rydalmere. Through looking at the available records, the Research Library team have researched and compiled a series of biographies that best match the name on the brass plate to the person who served.

Using historical local newspapers like *The Cumberland Argus and Fruitgrowers' Advocate* and Dundas Council Minutes, the project team discovered that this board was commissioned by the Municipality of Dundas Council at the suggestion of Alderman Frederick Ernest Spurway in September 1915 (figure 3). The roll of honour was to be placed permanently in Dundas Town Hall (the now former Dundas Municipal Council Chambers at 156 Marsden Road, Dundas).

ROLL OF HONOR.

Alderman F. E. Spurway, at the council meeting this week, moved that a roll of honor be placed in the town hall, Dundas, to perpetuate the memory of solciers of the district going to the war. He said he knew of no nobler object than marking the respect they owed to the young men of the district volunteering for the greatest of all wars, sturdy sons of the Empire, some of them, and ready to sacrifice their lives for the British Empire. (Hear, hear). He would also suggest a nemorial board for those who may fall, distinct from the honor board. Alderman Taylor, seconding the motion, said it had his hearty support. The board would be a permanent monument of the valor and noble deeds of their heroes. The motion was heartily supported by the Mayor and Aldermen Greenwood and Neil, and carried unanimously. The Mayor and Aldermen Spurway and Greenwood were appointed a committee to report progress.

Created by Wunderlich Limited, a major manufacturer of pressed and stamped medal products, honour rolls and other war memorials for both world wars. The designer of this object is uncertain, as no documentation has been found. However, its art nouveau styling is like the Wunderlich Limited employees' roll of honour held at the Powerhouse Museum and those promoted in the Wunderlich Limited catalogues from the period.

According to the Conservation Report for this honour board, it is constructed of pressed copper panels mounted on a shellac polished blackwood backing board with a plywood sub-frame. The incised brass plates are secured in place with dome slot head brass screws.

The central brass plaque reads "For King & Empire", "Men who answered the call". The imagery on this honour roll is devoid of religious allusion. The use of the Union Jack and Australian flags relate to national and imperial identity. The laurels and banner at the top of the roll are a reference to the paraphernalia of Roman military triumphal parades. The word 'honour' is spelt with the American spelling 'honor' omitting the 'u' is another feature seen on other Wunderlich Limited honour boards.

The last digit for when the war was to end was not included in the initial board, as people did not know when the war was to end. This may explain the different colouring, bolts and why the last number was more likely to fall off (see figure 4).

Official unveiling of the Roll of Honour Ceremony at Dundas Town Hall in 1916

On 26 January 1916, Dundas Council received the roll of honour containing 32 names of soldiers who enlisted in the district. In time, more batches of names from neighbouring suburbs were inscribed and added as the local newspaper and Dundas Council minutes reveal.




Figure 5: Dundas: Roll of honor (1916, January 29). The Cumberland Argus and Fruitgrowers Advocate, page 8.

The Roll of Honour was unveiled on the evening of Saturday 4 March 1916 by Federal member for Parramatta, the Right Honourable Sir Joseph Cook, P.C., M.H.R. with initially 32 names on it at the Dundas Town Hall. He was accompanied by the newly elected State Member for Parramatta Mr Albert Bruntnell (1866 -1929). Mayor John Neil, Aldermen Frederick Charles Cox, David Auchterlonie, Herbert Greenwood, William Henry Catt, Alfred Henry Edwards, and Charles Watts were present. Dundas Public School headmaster William Lawson Hepburn (c1867-1926), Henry Robert Watts (father of Private Reginald Watts, service number 889 of the Australian 36 Infantry Battalion), Reverend Canon James Young, Reverend Henry Hugh Childs (of Eastwood), Sergeant John Wallace Wouter of the Australian 4 Battalion and local recruiting officer Mr C Thacker were also there. The board was originally erected at the back of the platform facing the main body of the hall.

Figure 7 recounts the lead up to the ceremony, while figure 8-9 recounts the day of the event and figure 10 is the Dundas Mayor reporting on the success of the public meeting.

Tucker-Jones (of Prospect and Shorwood). The run both ways was most enjoyable, and as the good people of Dundas proved, of course, as usual, warmhearted, sincerely courteous and generous, the Saturday evening's patriotic doings in the roomy hall, on that picturesquelysituated knoll opposite "Brush Farm," were in every way a great success.

The hall had been effectively prepared for the occasion: and it was well filled, the faces turned towards the speakers baing largely the best known in the district

Among those on the platform were Mayor Nell (in the chair), ex-Mayor F. C. Cos (father of "Fighting Charile" and of the late brave Australian soldier, Wallace Cox, of beloved memory), Aldermen F. Spurway, D. Auchterionie, Greenwood, Catt, Edwards and Watts, Mr. W. L. Hepburn (the headmaster of the local public school and successor to Mr. Sellars, whose name still clings to the lore of "the picturangue barough"), Mr. H. Watts (father of the suldier lad, Reg. Watts, now off to the front), Rev. Canon Toung, Rev. Mr. Childs (of Rastwood), Sergt. Wouter (4th Hattalion; the local recruiting officer, Mr. C. Thacker, and others. The proceedings were commenced with the National Anthem, joined in by all.

Mayor J. Neil, in a few interesting words, then introduced the programme of the evening, expressing in fitting terms the pride of Australians in the Empire to which we belong and in the patriotism of those of our sons who had already gone forward to help the motherland—some, alas, only to leave their sacred bones on the fire-covered hills of Gallipoli. A son of the Federal member (Mr. Cook) had been in the battle front, and had been wounded, but now it was pleasing to be said he had recovered and was on his way back for a short spell in his native land.

The Major, in the course of his few remarks, referred with extreme pleasure to to presence that evening at the Dundse Town Hall of Mr. Albert Bruntnell, M.L.A. (their newly-slected representative)) and of ex-Mayor F. C. Cox, J.P. (father of Colonel Cos, C.B.).

The speaker was informed by ex-Mayor Cox that word had just arrived that his son, "Fighting Charlie," had been promoted and was now Brigadier.

"Three cheers for the gallant and renowned representative of the old "Parramatta Lancers" were here given.

A stirring address was then delivered by the Hight Hon. Jos. Cook, who explained in fitting terms how he esteemed highly the great privilege of being present that evoluing to perform the ceremony of unretling the foundas roll of honor, containing the hames of the brave local lade who had with others gone forward to do their duty for the Empire. Those names spoke eloquently, in their allence, of the value of those Australian soldier lade and of the value of their service to their country at the present time.

The roll of honor was here formally unveiled by Mr. Cook amid cheers. After a passing word of congratulation to those connected with the provision of the handsome tablet-and in reference in particuhar to the design and character of the roll of honor --- Mr. Cook said that it was with miand feelings that he took part in the tusiness of that evening; for it might be that some of the brave young Dundas soldiers whose names now appeared before them, as they sat in that hall that evening, would shed their blood for Australiaeven some of them might never come back to us again; they might follow to their butg home those whose hones now rested among the hills of Gallipoll, and whose sacred blood would fructify the seeds of liberty sown there by the Allies. In a letter from his son, the speaker had been told of a fact that was calculated to ettr our blond, as the facts of that "first landine" were reviewed now-that the Australarn troops would have "cone right. through," and on to Constantinople, had there but been sufficient mon to support the brave fellows who took part in that first grand charge in April last. Butsad If was to have to be told-there were not emorgh men? Not enough man. Had there been but another division to protect the danks of the attacking body of Austraffans and to protect their lines of comconditation, a different tale might now have to be tobl of the doings at the Dardata-fles. These men left all be-hind them to meet whatever fute was in front. Some of them whose names were there had made the last great sacrifice for their country, and their blood mingled with that of others in the soll of Gallipold. where they dared to hope it would fructify the seeds of liberty and freedom and pro duce a harvest of rich, rare fruitage in the coming time. And here he would like to put an aspect of the case which was apt to be overlooked by the demorcracy of today. What about that great principle of "equality of sacrifice" which lay at the very root of their democratic institutions? There was no law of reason or right which suggested that some should stay behind while others did the dangerous fighting for them. All of us had everything at stake, and therefore all of us should make sacrifices in the common cause. He felt impelled to say this because of the present slackness in recruiting. The 50,000 fresh troops offered by the Prime Minister were not visualising as they should. To be of the greatest use they should all have been mobilised by now. He hoped and believed they would get through with their present voluntary methods. But if they did not get the men freely, and quickly, too, then those methods would have to be changed. We could not sacrifice Australia and the cause of civilisation for the sake of a theory of any kind. The theory must go when it ceased to conserve the best interests of the nation. The safety of the State was the highest law, and must reforget that the great, fundamental, democratic principles were being put to the test. Taxation, we said, should be based on equality of sacrifice. It was a good working principle of Statecraft. In our games we required that there should be no shirkers. The slightest slackness was penalized. So in a business partnership all must do their utmost to preserve and expand the business. All must play the game and play it to the utmost. If this principle was good in the minor matters, how supremely imperative was it in the highest game—the biggest business of all-the saving of our race and nation? In a war like this a good many things had to go overboard-jettisoned for the safety and welfare of the ship of State. Some of the cherished traditions and institutions of a State had sometimes to go, and peo-ple bemoaned and bewailed their disaparance. This was the case just now in Great Britain. It was also the case in Australia. But what if the sacrifice meant the preservation of other traditions and institutions more valuable still? If the good went that the best might be retained. was not the justification complete? The condition of the war was critical. Men must go and go quickly ere it be too late. Those who could not go had our duties here, and they were equally imperative with those who had gone. Let it not be said of us that we slept at our post of futy. He read the other day of a mate who was discovered by the captain asleep on the bridge of a boat on the coast of America. The captain was so enraged and horrified that he took him by the collar and threw him down the passage-way to the deck. The officer felt the disgrace so keenly that he went to his cabin, wrote a letter to his wife, and then shot himself. If it was a disgraceful thing to be asleep at the post of duty when the lives of a ship's crew were in danger, how infinitely greater the disgrace to sleep at our post, when the entire crew of the great ship of State was thereby endangered!

"Let us." said Mr. Cook. "keep wide awaks to the fateful circumstances of these days. Men and yet more men are needed. We must get them, train them, send them to the support of their fellows overses and look well after those they leave behind them. And when their work is done there need he no doubt that it will be worth remembering. We shall write the record of il not alone on these tablets; we shall also engrave it on the tablet of our hearts, and the memory of it shall never fade."

Mr. Bruntnell, during his short and interesting address, quoted the moving lines of the poem, "The Man Rehind the Gon."

A must selemn part of the proceedings was reached when (all present standing reverently meanwhile) the Rev. Canon Young offered up a dedicatory prayer, committing into the divine keeping the men representing in the battle-line our Empire, and particularly those leaving Dundas district at the present time, and praying for a blessing on the Allies' cause —the caube of righteomaness, truth and eiviliaation in the world.

It was stated during the meeting that the son of ex-Mayor F. C. Cox-"Flichting Charlie" Cox, who had, after winning his spurs in the South African war, gone again to fight for the Engine. this time in Europe-bad been made a Brigadier; and cheers were given in connection with the receipt of the news of the splendld house of his proportion. Ex-Mayor F. F. Cox said a tew elappent and bunching words in reply.

Musical Rems were enjoyably relidered during the evening by Miss Walters, Mr. Trevitt, Miss Starkey, Miss Attwood, Mise Detilt, Miss Sporway, Mr. T. Carson, and others.

After the omial votes of thanks had been passed and requiried to, the failies of bundas entertained the distinguished visions growts and the others with them on the plutform, and a most successful meeting was bringht to a close with cheers for the King. On Wednesday 28 January 1920, the Roll of Honour was unveiled again at the Dundas Town Hall with 132 names. The ceremony was reported in *The Cumberland Argus and Fruitgrowers Advocate* (see figure 11).

Dundas' Tribute to its Soldiers.

General Cox's Popularity.

At Dundas Town Hall, on Wednesday, a large and representative gathering as bled to do honor to Senator General C. F. Cox, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., V.D., and Major Marr, D.S.O., both of whom are extremely popular in the district, the former being a native of Carlingford, where his respected parents still reside. Apologies were re-ceived for the absence of General C. Bosenthal, C.B., and Mr. A. Bruntnell, M.L.A. Seated on the platform with the Mayor of Dundas (Ald. R. Taylor, J.P.), and the distinguished soldier visitors, were Senator Pratten, ex-Mayor John Neil, J.P., Lieut. Johnston (returned soldier, and son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Johnston, Dundas), Mr. T. Carson (town clerk), and others; whilst Mrs. C. F. Cox and Miss Cox were seated in the body of the hall. Ald. Neil, who presided over the gathering pending the arrival of the Mayor, formally opened the proceedings; and "Cod Save the King" was lustily given. A song, "Old Fashioned Town," (encored) by Mr. Fashioned Town," (encored) by Mr. Percy Randell, and recitation by the town clerk, Mr. T. Carson, were followed by capital quartettes (encored) by members of the "Chimo" male quartette party (Messrs, Hammell, Stevens, Halliday and Craven). The latter also contributed "Jack Briton" capitally. Senator Pratton was accorded a hearty welcome when formally introduced; and he later deliver-ed a stirring address. The Mayor, before calling upon Senator General C. F. Cox to perform the ceremony of unveiling an honor roll containing 132 names of Dundas district boys, said they were proud to have with them their old and esteemed friends "Charlie" Cox and Major "Charlie"

Marr, both of whom were well-known and esteemed in the district. He voiced the feelings of the residents and Australia in general when he expressed the wish that both would live long and be of still greater service to the country. (Cheers).

er service to the country. (Cheers). Senator General Cox, who was loudly cheered when rising to return thanks for the welcome, said he esteemed it an honor to be called upon to perform the unveiling ceremony. Speaking as a native of the district, he desired to congratulate the district, he desired to congratulate the boys of Dundas district on their pluck and courage in enlisting in the war. Anstralia had sent 300,000 of the cream of the land to fight. Of course, in a muster of 300,000 men, there were some who were not saints or angels; but the vast majority of them were a credit to Australia. The General also paid a compliment to the women war workers, whose magnificent work could not be over-estimated. His hearers could not possibly imagine the terrible ordeals of warfare; and there were occasions when it was possible to read a newspaper in the valleys under the terrible effect of gunfire and explosions. They deeply mourned their lost ones, whose memory they would herish.

General Cox then removed the covering of the honor roll, the audience rising for the occasion.

Senator Pratten said he was delighted to be present that evening to do honor to their valiant soldiers. He paid a tribute to Senator General Cox and Major Marr, 1 whom he also congratulated on their success at the Federal polls, held recently. Speaking of the war, he referred to the part Australian soldiers had played in bringing about a glorious peace. The democracy of the British nation was again safe, and it was for them to keep it safe and use their power as it ought to be used. They were now faced with the solemn duty of perpetuating the noble deeds of their brave soldiers, who deserved well at their hands. Major Marr said he had the pleasing

duty thrust upon him of presenting to the conneil (on behalf of the denor) a fullsized framed colored photograph of Senator General Cox, whose popularity and good name were known throughout the Commonwealth. Major Marr unveiled the photograph, and the commany lustily sang (Una he commany lustily sang

"For he's a jolly good fellow." Senator General Cox said it gave him great pleasure to accede to the wish of the council to present a life-size photograph of himself, which he did in deference to the wishes of many of his old friends.

Ald. Neil stressed the point of Australia's duty to the returned soldiers, whom he welcomed back to their native land.

The Mayor also added a few appropriate words, and a rocitation. "How Me-Dougall topped the score," by Mr. Jack Fraker, and more quartettes by the aforementioned artists, brought the proceedings to a close. Mr. J. B. Sherlock ably officiated at the piano.

Following the passing of the Local Government (Areas) Act 1948, the Parramatta City Council was re-formed incorporating the councils of Parramatta (incorporated 1861), Granville (incorporated 1885), Dundas (incorporated 1889), Ermington, and Rydalmere (incorporated 1891). On 1 January 1950, it was publicly announced that all branch offices of the Council at Granville, Dundas and Rydalmere Town Halls were to be closed and moved to the refurbished City Hall (Parramatta Town Hall and now demolished Council Chambers) at Centenary Square, Church Street, Parramatta.

Thus, the Roll of Honour tablet was moved and placed in storage until present day.

Municipality of Dundas Council and Dundas Town Hall

The Municipality of Dundas was initially proclaimed as the "Borough of Dundas" on 23 March 1889 by the Governor of New South Wales, Lord Charles Robert Wynn-Carrington. The first Dundas council comprised of nine Aldermen elected on 18 May 1889. They included Joseph Franks, Jeffry Grime and William Midson of Carlingford, James Fulford and George Adamson of Ermington Alexander Eyles, George Spurway and James Sonter of Field of Mars, and John Ryan of Rydalmere. Their first official council meeting was held at Rydalmere Hall, Rydalmere N.S.W. on 22 May 1889 where James Fulford (1841-1922) was elected the first mayor. Following a petition, on 30 December 1889, the borough was divided into three wards: North Ward, Central Ward and South Ward.

Dundas Town Hall

On the evening of Friday 26 September 1890, Dundas Town Hall officially opened. It was located at 156 Marsden Road, Dundas, N.S.W. About 500 people attended the opening. In time, significant modifications to the building were made including an addition in the 1900s and another addition on Marsden Road in 1938. In 2003, the building was converted into townhouses.

Municipality of Ermington and Rydalmere Council

In early 1891, prevailing dissatisfaction with Dundas Council at Ermington and Rydalmere led to 94 residents of the South Ward submitting a petition to the Colonial Secretary's Department requesting the separation of southern part of the municipality. Thus, the "Municipal District of Ermington and Rydalmere" was proclaimed on 18 June 1891. The separation also led to the reconstitution of Dundas, which was proclaimed as East Ward and West Ward with a total of six aldermen on the same day.

Municipality of Dundas Council

On 6 June 1902, the Dundas council wards were rearranged into three wards with the addition of the Central Ward adding three aldermen to the number from February 1903. From 28 December 1906, following the passing of the *Local Government Act 1906*, the council was renamed as the "Municipality of Dundas". Figure 3 shows the area the Municipality of Dundas.

Amalgamation and the City of Parramatta Council

From 1 January 1949, under the *Local Government (Areas) Act 1948*, the councils of Ermington and Rydalmere (incorporated 1891), Dundas (incorporated 1889) and Granville (incorporated 1885) were merged into the Parramatta (incorporated in 1861) council area to form the "City of Parramatta", later renamed Parramatta City Council. The Dundas municipality became "Dundas Ward", returning four aldermen. Former Dundas mayor Eric Arthur Mobbs, became the first mayor of the expanded City of Parramatta.

In 1950, following a re-organisation of Parramatta's wards, the Ermington-Rydalmere ward was absorbed into the Dundas Ward with the addition of two more aldermen.

In 1995, another re-organisation of the City of Parramatta local government area resulted in five electoral areas being renamed. Dundas Ward was divided into parts of the now former "Lachlan Macquarie Ward" and "Elizabeth Macarthur Ward". Each Ward had three councillors, with a total of 15 councillors.

On 12 May 2016, the boundaries of the City of Parramatta Council was changed with the Local Government (Council Amalgamations) Proclamation 2016 under the *Local Government Act* 1993 (NSW).




Figure 9: City of Parramatta Wards as of 12 May 2016 (Image source: City of Parramatta Council)


Geoffrey Newbon Bennett - Service Number: 4137

Taken on strength, he was transferred to the 54 Battalion on 21 March 1916 and on 4 July; he was transferred to the 14 Light Trench Mortar Battery. Two days later, he returned to the 54 Battalion and was promoted Sergeant (on 12 August 1916), Second Lieutenant (2 September 1916) and Corporal ranking (on 24 May 1916) in France. On 25 May 1919, he was discharged from the Army. Based on a letter in his military papers, it appears on 24 January 1921, he married Yorkshire English girl Marguerite Deforges Romanoff in the Ryde Register Office and they had a daughter Aubrey May Newbon Bennett born in London, England, on 11 February 1922. On 16 February 1979, a funeral notice for him was published in The Sydney Morning Herald. He was aged 82 years old and a late resident of Carlingford and Greenwich.


Thomas Newbon Bennett - Service Number: 1800

Thomas Newbon Bennett was born in Carlingford, New South Wales, the son of Charles Henry Bennett and Edith Victoria Amy (nee Willis) of 'Max Gate', Pennant Hills Road, Carlingford. He was a former student of Sydney Grammar School and was part of the Sydney Grammar School Cadets. Private Bennett was an 18 year old scholar having passed his Leaving Certificate examination with Honours at the Sydney University in 1915 and gaining a medical exhibition before he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 16 March 1916. On 4 September 1916, he embarked from Sydney on board the HMAT 'A15 Port Sydney' as a Private of the 36 Australian Infantry Battalion, 2 Reinforcement. Serving on the Western Front, he was unfortunately killed by shell fire in Messines, Belgium on the 7 June 1917 and is buried at the Toronto Avenue Cemetery (row B, grave number 10) in Warneton, Belgium. He was aged 19 years and 9 months. He is also listed on panel 126 of the Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour.



George Arthur Bevan - Service Number: 2054

Private George Arthur Beven was a local resident of Carlingford, New South Wales. He was a labourer and 29 years old when he enlisted. This was on the 1 February 1915. He became part of the 2 Battalion and travelled on the 'Ionian' as part of the 5 Reinforcements unit and landed at the Gallipoli Peninsula. There he developed concussion from exposure to shellfire and had to be admitted to hospital in Alexandria, Cairo in July 1915 where he received rest and treatment. Deemed medically unfit for active service, he was medically discharged on the 25 January 1916 and returned to Australia later that same year.




Alex Norman Body - Service Number: 1523

Bruce Harold Brown was born in Muswellbrook, New South Wales, the son of John Joseph Brown of Eastwood Avenue, Eastwood. He was a 19 year old clerk when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 16 October 1916. He had previously served in the New South Wales Militia for 5 years. On 10 May 1917, he embarked from Melbourne, Victoria as a Private of the 7 Australian Light Horse Regiment, 25 Reinforcement unit aboard the HMAT 'A42 Boorara'. His unit was involved in the battle of Beersheba that began on 31 October 1917, the capture of Jerusalem in December, the Amman (24-27 February) and Es Salt (30 April-4 May) raids, and helped defeat a joint Turkish-German attack launched on the Jordan bridgehead around Musallabeh on 14 July 1918. After serving for two years, he returned to Australia on 9 April 1919.

Clive Catt - Service Number: 2916

Private Clive Catt was from Carlingford, New South Wales. He was twenty-two years old and a druggists clerk when he enlisted. This was on the 4 March 1915. He became part of the 5 Field Ambulance, C Section and his unit embarked from Sydney, New South Wales, on board HMAT 'A31 Ajana' on 31 May 1915. Private Catt received the Military Medal in August 1917. It was reported:

"On the 27th February 1917 at about 12-30 p.m. word was received at LE SARS A.D.S. that two men were lying wounded in an exposed position on the BAPAUME ROAD. Sergeant I. LING, Lance Corporal A. BAILEY, Private C. CATT and Private A. COE at once proceeded to locate these men. This was accomplished after a most dangerous and difficult search at about 800 yards from LE SARS A.D.S., two men of the 22nd Australian Infantry Battalion, attached to the V 2 A.T.M. Battery being found. No 361 bomber DODD H. was lying on the side of the road with shell wound in left thigh, and No. 316 Private BARTLEY R. was lying in a cellar, into which he had apparently fallen with a fractured skull and unconsciousness. First Aid was rendered, and through heavy shell fire, (both Shrapnel and High Explosive) the patients were conveyed to the R.A.P., the distance of carrying being 800 yards. Both on the forward and return journey several narrow escapes were experienced by the party. Major CHAPMAN the Officer i/c of the forward A.D.S's, further reports that this squad behaved in an exceptionally cool and courageous manner during the recent operations. I therefore wish to recommend these men for immediate reward, for untiring and conspicuous devotion to duty, and setting a fine example to those around them."

Private Catt returned to Australia in March 1919.

Myrt Connell - Service Number: 360

Myrt Connell was a 26 years old traveller when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 16 September 1914. He listed his mother Mrs Sarah Connell of 'Wyanbene', Carlingford Road, Epping, New South Wales as his next of kin. Born in Cooma, New South Wales. He was raised a Presbyterian. In his military papers, he is described as having a fair complexion, blue eyes, light brown hair and standing at 5 feet, 4.5 inches (163.83 cm) tall and weighed 10 stones (63.5 kg).

Prior to embarking for duties overseas, he was a trooper for two months (until 17 November 1914) and then Corporal and Acting Sergeant (until 23 November 1914). On 21 December 1914, he left as a Sergeant of the 6 Australian Light Horse Regiment, C Squadron from Sydney aboard the HMAT 'Suevic A29'. On 17 August 1915, while stationed in Gallipoli, he was admitted to hospital due to conjunctivitis. By 15 September 1915, he was admitted to the London War Hospital for his eyes. On 4 February 1916, he rejoined his regiment in Maadi, Egypt. On 15 May 1916, he was in hospital for tonsillitis. On 1 October 1916, he was sent to the hospital on a third occasion and diagnosed with piles in Cairo, Egypt.

Sergeant Major Connell returned to Australia per HMAT 'Boorara' on 29 September 1917 and discharged due to defective vision on 6 February 1918. One of his brothers who also Corporal Richard enlisted was Connell (service number 36596). Post war, he resided in Strathfield, New South Wales. On 4 December 1954, he passed away at the Concord Repatriation General Hospital and was privately cremated at the Northern Suburbs.

He served on the Western Front and taken on strength, he later was promoted to Corporal ranking and was attached to the 1 Divisional Ammunition Column. On 2 May 1919, he was discharged from service after returning to Australia. Hor his service, he was issued a British War Medal and Victory Medal. His brother Myrt Connell also enlisted as a Private of the 6 Light Horse Regiment (service number 360) and returned to Australia on 23 August 1917.

Wallace Cox - Service Number Unknown

Captain Wallace Cox was the brother of Lieutenant Colonel Cox. Educated at Kings School, Parramatta, he was a 31 year old fruit grower by the time he enlisted on 27 August 1914. Initially he was a Lieutenant in B Squadron of the 7 Light Horse Brigade but he was a courageous soldier and by the time he died of his wounds he was a Captain serving in the 1 Light Horse Brigade. Captain Wallace Cox was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Cox, of Parramatta and Carlingford, and brother of the distinguished soldier, Colonel Charles F. Cox, C.B. He died from wounds received at Gallipoli on 17 August 1915 and was a popular member of the Carlingford District Progress Association. Both brothers were wounded at the same time and there had been hope for a while that Wallace would recover from his wounds. His father Mr. F. C. Cox was Mayor of Parramatta in 1884 and was for many years an alderman of the council.

Charles Frederick Cox - Service Number Unknown

Charles Frederick Cox was 51 when he enlisted on 15 September 1914. At this time he resided at 26 Croydon Road Croydon. He was born in 1863 at Pennant Hills and was educated and married in Parramatta, where he also maintained his connections with the New South Wales Lancers. He joined the Lancers in 1891 and was selected to head a detachment for Queen Victoria's Jubilee celebrations in London in 1897. He served with the New South Wales Volunteer Corps in the Boer war and was among the first Australian's to disembark at cape Town, South Africa, in 1899. Not content with one visit he returned to the conflict in 1901, this time with the 3rd NSW Mounted Rifles. On the 15th of October 1902 Cox was welcomed home at a specially prepared conversazione, at the Parramatta Town Hall, where all the notable citizens gathered to hear him speak. Twelve years later he was speaking at another conversazione held in the same hall in honour of his departure, and as it would turn out, an illustrious career at Gallipoli and in the Palestinian Campaigns. He appears to have been left in Australia after the departure of the first contingent of the 1 Light Horse Brigade as part of the reinforcements. He then was assigned to the 6 Regiment in the 2 Light horse brigade and left for Egypt in December 1914. Cox then went to Gallipoli with the 6 Light Horse Regiment and after being wounded in the knee with shrapnel 21 May 1915 returned to the peninsula where he was raised to the rank of Temporary Colonel while in command of the 2 Light Horse Brigade. On 3 November he resumed command of the 6 Light Horse. His stellar career continued and on 28 November 1915 he was appointed temporary command of the entire 1 Light Horse Brigade. Cox returned to Australia 19 April 1919.

John Chawick Crichton - Service Number: 58690

John was born in 1882 in Balmain, New South Wales, the son of John and Elizabeth Crichton. He was married to Mrs Margaret Jean Crichton (nee Wilkins) and the couple resided at Elizabeth Street, Carlingford, New South Wales. John was also an operative plumber and had previously served 8.5 years with the Militia Field Engineers. At 35 years old, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 3 March 1918 at the East Sydney Recruiting Depot in Darlinghurst. He left Sydney on a number of occasions, the first time on board the HMAT 'A40 Ceramic' on 22 December 1914, and then again on 19 June 1918 on board the HMT 'Field Marschall' as part of the 56 Battalion. He was later made a Gunner of the Artillery Details on 7 October 1918. On 23 October 1918, he was admitted to the Group Clearing Hospital in Sutton Veny suffering from influenza. He returned to Australia from London, England on 7 February 1919 per Hospital Transport (H.T.) 'Leicestershire' where he was discharged as medically unfit.


Norman Ernest Cropley Cupit - Service Number: 314A

John Wilfred Dabbs - Service Number: 615

Birmingham, England born native John Wilfred Dabbs was residing with his uncle J. Dabbs of Ardenode, Dundas, New South Wales when he joined the Australian Imperial Force on 22 August 1914 at Randwick. At the time, he was a 25 year old fitter. His parents, William Arthur and Alice Maud Dabbs lived at Raglan Road, Smethwick, England. He also had three brother also serving. Private Dabbs left Sydney with the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion, F Company on board Transport 'A23 Suffolk' on 18 October 1914. Taken on strength, he was promoted to the rank of Second Lieutenant. He was awarded the Military Medal according to The Commonwealth Gazette, No. 62 (dated 19 April 1917) for his actions at Lone Pine: "When his Officer had been wounded DABBS took charge of a section of the captured trench of Lone Pine and barricaded the main communication trench leading from Knife Edge, his action prevented the enemy from bombing our Machine gun which was in this sector; he showed great bravery and coolness during the counter-attacks by the enemy." Sadly, he was killed in action on 5 September 1916, aged 26. He is buried at the Railway Dugouts Burial Ground (Plot VI, Row M, Grave No. 10) (Transport Farm) in Zillebeke, Belgium. His name also appears on Panel number 32 of the Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour.



Francis Herbert Warwick Dabbs - Service Number Unknown

Francis Herbert Warwick Dabbs was a well-known dentist from Eastwood, New South Wales. He was born on 17 May 1893 in Shafford-Avon, England, the only son of John Francis and Emily Dabbs of Eastwood, and new husband of Alice Dora Dovers - who he married at St James' Church on King Street, Sydney on 20 November 1915. It appears he enlisted in 1915 and served as Second Lieutenant (later Lieutenant) of the 19 Infantry (Kuring-gai). In 1918, he was part of the Gradation list of Officers. Post war, he moved his dental practice to Yass, New South Wales. During World War Two, he enlisted again in the Australian Army on 29 March 1942 and served as Lieutenant of the 14 Battalion Volunteer Defence Corps until his discharge on 13 September 1945. On 7 July 1965, he passed away and is buried at the Northern Suburbs Memorial Gardens and Crematorium.

Harold James Dawe - Service Number: 3501

Harold was born in 1892 in Ashfield, New South Wales, the son of Mr James G Dawe and Margaret E. Dawe of Macquarie Street, Auburn, New South Wales. At 23 years old carpenter, he decided to enlist in the Australian Imperial Force on 17 October 1915. He left Sydney on board HMAT A35 Berrima on 12 December that year as a Private of the 19 Australian Infantry Battalion, 8 Reinforcement. Taken on strength, he was later promoted to Corporal ranking and was attached to the 55 Battalion. On 4 May 1917, he was returned to Australia. Post war, he married Frances Peachey in Granville, New South Wales in 1920. On 10 May 1970, he passed away at the Concord Repatriation General Hospital, aged 77. His last residency was in Warriewood, New South Wales.

Alwin Ernest Dawes of the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion, Cycle Corps died of his wounds on 16 August 1918 in France a few days short of his 22 birthday on 21 September. On 18 May 1918, he left Sydney as a Private of the 3 Divisional Cyclist Company on board HMAT 'A64 Demosthenes'. Serving on the Western Front, he was wounded in April before he succumbed to his death, aged 21. He is buried at Daours Communal Cemetery Extension (Plot IV, Row C, Grave number 12) in France and his name is honoured on Panel number 32 of the Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour.

John Charlton Dickinson - Service Number: 7481

Private John Charlton Dickinson was eighteen years old and an electrical engineer when he enlisted in January 1916. He was from Carlingford, New South Wales and became part of the Divisional Signal Company 1, Reinforcement 16. His unit embarked from Sydney, New South Wales, on board 'SS Makarini' on 1 April 1916. 
Lionel Hepburn - Service Number: 94589

Ross Hepburn - Service Number: Unknown

Lieutenant Ross Hepburn was twenty-three years old and the son of local Dundas Public School teacher Mr William Lawson Hepburn where the family lived on Spurway Street, Dundas, New South Wales. On 27 October 1916, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force. Prior to enlisting, he was a bank clerk at the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney and had previously been stationed in branches in Dungog, Moss Vales and Wollongong, where he was popular with the locals. He became part of the 39 Battalion, 5 Reinforcement and embarked from Sydney on board HMAT 'A24 Benalla' on 9 November 1916. On 23 April 1918, he was severely wounded in action in France suffering from gunshot wounds to his neck, back and a fractured skull to the point there were rumours back home that he was killed. Fortunately, he recovered and re-joined his Unit in France ex England on 12 September 1918. He was transferred from France to England and admitted to the 3 London General Hospital again on 14 October 1918 suffering from a mild dislocation of semilunar cartilage. On 27 December 1919, he embarked from London for the return journey back to Australia. Post war, he resumed working in the banking sector, where he worked as a bank manager in Bowral before moving to Mudgee with his wife. On 1 July 1965, he passed away, a former resident of Rose Bay.



James Ferguson Heron - Service Number: 2853

James Ferguson Heron was born in 1871 in St. Leonards, Sydney, New South Wales, the second son of William Channing and Dora Heron of Strathfield, and husband of Lucy Bernard Heron (nee Gomm) of Adderton Road, Dundas. He was 44.5 years old orchardist when he joined the Australian Imperial Force on 24 June 1915. On 30 September 1915, he left Sydney as a Private of the 1 Australian Infantry Battalion, 9 Reinforcement unit aboard the HMAT 'A8 Argyllshire'. Taken on strength, he transferred to the 53 Battalion. Returned to Australia on 13 March 1918. Postwar, he settled in Willoughby, New South Wales and on 14 July 1940, he passed away at his home, aged 69.

Taken on strength, he later joined the 54 Battalion on16 February 1916 in Tel el Kebir, Egypt. Sailing from Alexandria (Egypt) for the Western Front, he disembarked in Marseilles, France on 29 June 1916. Sadly, although initially reported missing on 19 or 20 July 1916. A court of enquiry found on 4 August 1917 that he was killed in action on those dates. He was aged 20. He has no known grave but his name is inscribed on the panel number 10 of the V.C. Corner in the Australian Cemetery Memorial in Fromelles, France and panel number 159 of the Roll of Honour in the Australian War Memorial in Canberra, Australian Capital Territory.

Arthur 'Mick' Mobbs was born in Parramatta, New South Wales, the son of Mr J. A. and Mrs Rachel Mobbs of Cox's Lane, Carlingford. He was a 25 year old blacksmiths floor man at Harris' Limited in Parramatta when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 18 January 1915. He embarked from Sydney on board HMAT A55 Kyarra on 13 April 1915 as a Private of the 3 Australian Infantry Battalion, 5 Reinforcement unit. He was wounded between 7 and 12 August 1915. Some confusion cause his fellow soldier Private J Wilkinson to believe he was shot in the head and buried. Fortunately, a letter he wrote to mother on 14 September and subsequently published in The Cumberland Argus and Fruitgrowers Advocate (6 November 1915, page 10) indicated that he was in hospital and progressing favourably:

"Just a line to let you know I am better. I got wounded in the hip on the 6rh of August. I expect you don't get much news out there. We are giving the Turks all they want. On August 6, 7 and 8 the Australians advanced about four miles. The Turks were lying all over the place. We took about 700 prisoners. I saw Colonel Cox, and he wanted to know how you were getting on. He looks and feels well himself."

After serving for four years, he was attached to the 1 Field Company Engineers when he returned to Australia. His brother Cecil who was a Clyde Engineering Company employee also enlisted.

Lionel Ackers Parsons - Service Number: 3811

Lionel Ackers Parsons was born on 15 December 1896 in Townsville, Queensland, the son of Neal and Edith Mary Parsons, of Pembroke Street, Epping, New South Wales. He was killed in action and died between 22 - 25 July 1916, aged 19. He has no known grave but is commemorated on the plaque in Epping Uniting (formerly Methodist) Church, the Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour Panel number 30, and on the Australian National Memorial in Villers-Bretonneux, France. Lionel was only 18 years old when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 5 September 1915. At the time, he was a motor mechanic and left as a Private of the 12 Reinforcement, 1 Australian Infantry Battalion on 11 December 1915 on board the HMAT 'Mooltan'. Landing in Egypt, he also served on the Western Front where he tragically was killed. He had a brother Sergeant Norman William Parsons of the 13 Australian Infantry Battalion (service number 1301) also serve and fight in the Gallipoli campaign. The Cumberland Argus and Fruitgrowers' Advocate (on 26 August 1916, page 11) reported Lionel's death and that Norman was in a London hospital receiving treatment for shock and hearing trouble. Norman was eventually returned home to Australia on 8 October 1918.

On 9 November 1915, he was wounded at Gallipoli and was invalided to Fulham Military Hospital in England; returning to duty in August 1916. During his 3 years of service, he was stationed in Egypt, Gallipoli and France; and was attached to the Australian Corps School when he returned to Australia on 8 October 1918. His brother Lionel Acher Parsons (service number 3811) also enlisted but sadly was killed in action between 22-25 July 1916, aged 19.

Alick Ernest Pattinson - Service Number: N85701

Alick Ernest Pattinson was born on 13 February 1878 in Rockhampton, Queensland. At the time of his enlistment on 6 December 1917 in East Sydney, New South Wales, he was almost 40 years old, a poultry farmer and married to Lottie Margaret Pattison. They had two children and were living at Braeside, Ermington, New South Wales. According to his enlistment papers, he had also previously served in the Cape Mounted Police for 1 year and 122 days until the expiration of services. Private Alick Pattison was given a social farewell along side Private Raymond Emmerson on Saturday 16 February 1918 at the Dundas Town Hall. The event was chaired by Alderman Frederick Ernest Spurway of the Dundas Council. Both soldiers received a wrist watch as a departing gift which Lottie affixed to her husband's wrist. From 14 January1918, as a recruit he was stationed in the Liverpool training camp attached to the 1 Infantry Depot Battalion until 22 May 1918 when he was discharged having been found medically unfit for further service.

Taken on strength, he was later promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant. He was discharged in London, England on 21 November 1919 in effect of his unit being demobilised according to his 'Proceedings on Discharge' paper. Addition information noted was that his intended place of residence was 101 Albert Road, Handsworth, Birmingham; his trade was Accountant and a descriptive mark of him was having 'Little toe missing from each foot'.

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

He left Melbourne, Victoria, as a Private of the Machine Gun Company 9, Reinforcement 5 on board HMAT 'A38 Ulysses' on 25 October 1916. On 14 July 1917, he was admitted to the Royal Victoria Hospital in Natley, England suffering from gunshot wounds to his left thigh and right side. Taken on strength, he was later promoted to Corporal ranking and attached to the 3 Machine Gun Battalion. On 3 July 1919, he was returned to Australia per H.T. 'Prinz Hubertus'. For his services, he was issued the 1914/15 Star Medal, British War Medal and the Victory medal. Post war, he passed his surveyor's examination with an Order of Merit and was appointed by the Department of Lands as a Licensed Surveyor for the State of New South Wales in early October 1923. On Australia Day 26 January 1987, he passed away.

Ernest Keith Sharp - Service Number: 5896

Ernest Keith Sharp was born in the district of Ashfield, New South Wales, the son of Charles E. and Eda Sharp of Karonga, Pembroke Street, Epping. Brother of Eric, Ken, Mrs Aline Everall and Mrs Doris Thompson. On 14 October 1915, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force. At the time, he was an 18 year old clerk. He left for active service overseas from Melbourne, Victoria, on board HMAT 'A62 Wandilla' on 9 November 1915 as a gunner of the Field Artillery Brigade 1, Reinforcement 12 unit. Taken on strength, he was transferred to the 14 Field Artillery Brigade. According to the Commonwealth Gazette No. 95 (dated 27 June 1918), he was awarded the Military Medal for his bravery and courage he showed:


"At 6.30 a.m. on the 4th October 1917, whilst the 53rd Battery was in action East of Westhoek near Ypres and co-operating in an attack by our Infantry, a 15cm shell burst in the ammunition of No. 1 Gun, killing two of the detachment and severely wounding two others. No. 5896 Gunner E.K. SHARP ran to the gun pit and with the assistance of Gunner E.A.F. TOCKNELL pulled Bombardier HEWITT, who had been severely wounded, out of reach of the blazing ammunition and placed him in a trench near by. Despite the heavy shelling by the enemy and also the bursting ammunition, this Gunner again returned to the gun pit and with the help of Gunner TOCKNELL succeeded in getting Gunner BURGESS clear of the exploding ammunition. The utter disregard of personal safety and the splendid example set by this man are deserving of special recognition."

On 8 April 1918, he returned to Australia. On 16 October 1954, he passed away at the Concord Repatriation General Hospital. His funeral notice in the Sydney Morning Herald (19 October 1954, page 24) indicate his address was Victoria Parade, Manly and that his funeral took place at St. Matthew's Church of England, The Corso in Manly. He is interred at the Northern Suburbs Crematorium.



Charles William Shepherd - Service Number: 2676A and N33991

Charles William Shepherd was born in Granville, New South Wales, the son of Mrs Rose Ann Shepherd of Davis Street, Merrylands, New South Wales. He was a locomotive fireman who stated his address as being care of Mrs Cox, William Street, Auburn, New South Wales. He first enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 11 July 1915 as a soldier for the 30 Infantry Battalion, 11 Reinforcement unit in the Liverpool camp but was discharged on 5 October 1915 after being found physically unfit with weak lungs. He re-enlisted on 26 May 1916, at 23.5 year old and joined the 1 Australian Pioneer Battalion, 5 Reinforcement unit as a Private when they embarked from Sydney on 24 August 1916 aboard HMAT 'A68 Anchises' for England. By 24 January 1917, his unit had proceeded to France. He returned to England on 4 July 1917 and was admitted to the Richmond Military Hospital suffering from pleurisy on 18 August 1917. On 13 January 1918, he was returned to Australia per HMAT 'Karoola' and discharged for being medically unfit on 12 July 1918.



George Weddup - Service Number 3311

George Weddup was born in Hove, England, the son of Charles Weddup of 51 Newington Road, Marrickville, Sydney, New South Wales. He was 23 years old and working for the Epping railway department as a railway porter, when he volunteered to join the Australian Army on 16 August 1915. On Wednesday 29 October, before going into training camp, George received a social send-off and presentation at the School of Arts in Eastwood. Epping stationmaster Mr F J Colls presented him with a wristlet watch on behalf of his friends and comrades. He left for overseas duties on 20 December that year on board the HMAT 'A29 Suevic' from Sydney as a Private of the 17 Australian Infantry Battalion, 7 Reinforcement. Taken on strength, he was transferred to the 55 Battalion. He returned to Australia on 5 March 1919.

Malvine Florence Wellisch - Service Number: Nurse

Malvine Florence Wellisch was born in 1885 in Sydney, New South Wales, the daughter of Austrian born migrant Mr. Albert L. Wellisch and Kate Sophia Wellisch (nee Moody). She was also the sister of the late Sergeant Frederick Wellisch (service number 254) who was killed at the Dardanelles on 26 April 1915 and Captain Dr. Gilbert Cherrington Wellisch of the Australian Army Medical Corps during the First World War. At the time, the family were living at 'Killetra', Kent Street, Epping. Malvine was part of the Queen Alexandra Imperial Military Nursing Service Reserve in England. After the war, she married Englishman Percy Douglas Abbott on 12 July 1918 in Calcutta, India and they settled in England like her brother Dr. Gilbert Wellisch, who changed his surname by deed poll. In 1972, Malvine Abbott passed away in Bucklow, Cheshire, England, aged 87.

Frederick Wellisch - Service Number: 254

Company Quartermaster Sergeant Frederick Wellisch was killed while in action at the Dardanelles on 26 April 1915. He was the son of Austrian born migrant Mr. Albert L. Wellisch of the Tamworth Lands office and Kate Sophia Wellisch, and brother of Captain Gilbert Cherrington Wellisch of the Australian Army Medical Corps. Frederick was 31 years of age and was a native of Sydney, New South Wales, although at the time of his enlistment on 17 August 1914, the family were living at 'Killetra', Kent Street, Epping. Before enlisting, he was an accountant at the head office of the AMP Society and had previously served in the AMP Rifle Corps. He left Sydney for the front on 18 October 1914 on board the Transport 'A23 Suffolk' and was a member of the 2 Battalion of the first Expeditionary Force. He has no known grave, but his name is commemorated on the Lone Pine Memorial (panel 16) in Gallipoli, Turkey.

Gilbert Carrington Wellisch - Service Number: Captain

Medical practitioner Gilbert Carrington Wellisch volunteered his services to the Australian Imperial Force on the 1 March 1917. He was 23 years old at the time and living in Epping, New South Wales. He was the son of Albert and Kate S. Wellisch of 'Killetra', Kent Street, Epping. Prior to enlisting, he had been in the S U Scouts. On 14 June 1917, he left Sydney for the front as a Captain of the Medical Officers in the Australian Army Medical Corps on board HMAT 'A20 Hororata'. He first served for four months on depot duty in England before being transferred to the 14 Australian Field Ambulance in France for four months, he was then Regimental Medical Officer (R.M.O.) of the 55 Battalion for two months, and then RMO of the 5 Machine Gun Battalion until the Armistice. He was discharged on 20 October 1919. Although, he remained in England until 10 July 1920 as Senior House Surgeon at Croydon General Hospital in Surrey. He return to Australia in September that year. Gilbert later changed his surname to Wellish by deed poll in 1920. His middle name Parrington has been misspelt and is actually spelt Charrington. His brother Sergeant Frederick Wellisch (service n umber 254) was killed in the Gallipoli landing.

Arthur James White was born in 1889 in Newcastle, New South Wales, the son of John Albert and Ellen Rebecca S White. He was living with his family at 'Morden', Oxford Street, Epping, New South Wales at the time of his enlistment on 23 February 1915. He was single bachelor of 26 years of age and working as a steelwork fitter. On 10 April 1915, he left as a Private of the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion, 4 Reinforcement on board the HMAT 'A8 Argyllshire'. Landing in Gallipoli, Turkey on 26 May 1915, he was wounded on 8 August 1915, leading to his evacuation to Egypt for treatment on 11 August. He lost 2 fingers and was invalided to Australia per H.S. 'Karoola' on 4 November 1915. On 28 July 1958, he passed away. He was a late resident of Epping.

George William White - Service Number: 359

George William White was born in Coburg, Victoria but later moved to Sydney, New South Wales, where as a young lad he was educated at Fort Street and Ryde Public Schools. He was the son of William John and Emily Georgina White of York Street, Epping. The family appears to later have moved to Granville. He was a 22 year old survey draughtsman when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 24 August 1914. On 18 October 1914, he left Sydney as a Private of the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion, C Company, on board ship Transport 'A23 Suffolk'. Sadly he was killed at Gallipoli, Turkey on 25 April 1915. He was 22 years old and is buried at Baby 700 Cemetery (row D, grave number 20) at Gallipoli, Turkey. He is also commemorated in Field of Mars Cemetery in Ryde, New South Wales. His brother John Stanley White of the 7 Australian Infantry Battalion (service number 7080) died of wounds on 26 August 1918.

Frederick Willis - Service Number: 5779

Frederick Willis was born in Ermington, New South Wales and was the son of William Willis and Mrs. Willis. Before he enlisted, he was a 29-year-old bachelor who worked as labourer Riverina area. He enlisted on 24 January 1916 and embarked from Sydney on the ship HMAT 'A55 Kyarra' on 3 June 1916 as part of the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion, 18 Reinforcement. Private Willis's tour of duty went from August 1916 to May 1919. In that time, he was stationed in England and France. From January to June of 1917, he was hospitalised with septic and inflamed feet. In September 1917, Private Willis was wounded in action from a gunshot wound to his left arm in France and hospitalised until October that year. In April 1918, he was wounded in action in France for a second time with a gunshot wound to his left buttock and then hospitalised until July. Mr. Willis departed England for Australia on 31 May 1919, set foot on Australian soil on 12 July, and was discharged on the 18 October that year. For his service, he would be awarded the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

James Thomas Wright - Service Number: 697

James Thomas Wright was born on 24 October 1892 in Cudal, New South Wales. At the time of his enlistment, he lived in Lockwood Street, Merrylands. His occupation was listed as boundary rider and wharf labourer. He named his father as next of kin. He enlisted on 23 August 1914 at the age of 22. He embarked from Sydney on 18 October 1914 on board Transport 'A23 Suffolk', landing in the Dardanelles, Turkey, on 25 April with the 2 Australian Infantry Battalion. He was wounded in action in the Dardanelles on two occasions. After a brief convalescence, he fought at Lone Pine where he was again wounded in action. After a further period of convalescence, in late December 1916 he was subsequently wounded again, this time in the leg. He returned to Australia in January 1916. He received further treatment at Randwick Hospital, New South Wales. He was discharged on 1 October 1916. He re-enlisted on 16 April 1919 naming his mother as next of kin and stating his occupation as carpenter. This time, he was 26 years of age. He was awarded the Star Medal, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. On 7 July 1957, he passed away. He has a plaque in the New South Wales Garden of Remembrance. In 1967, his sister applied for the Anzac Commemorative Medallion as she had been James Wright's carer, and he appeared to have met the criteria, having served on the Peninsula and having died prior to the 1960s.

The End of World War One

Parramatta was involved with the signing of the Peace Treaty at Versailles at the end of the war. Local member Sir Joseph Cook was one of the signatories to the Peace Treaty in Versailles and, at the time of signing, he was the Deputy Prime Minister, Minister for the Navy and Federal Member for the Parramatta Electorate.

The signing of the Peace Treaty on 28 June 1919 officially signalled the end of World War 1. Although fighting was suspended on 11th November 1918 when the Germans requested fighting be suspended (armistice), it took seven months for all the negotiations to be completed. The treaty was signed in Paris, along with four other treaties as part of peace negotiations relating to establishing conditions of peace with Germany. Along with Sir Joseph Cook, Australia's other representatives included the Prime Minister Billy Hughes and Lieutenant Commander J.G. Latham, of the Royal Australian Naval Reserve.

Cook's speech titled, When Shall their Glory Fade is outlined below.

Your proposal seems a happy idea. These brave sons and citizens of the district have already written their names high on the scroll of the world's fame. Their name has gone out into all the earth. To pay them an affectionate tribute in the manner suggested is a duty we all owe them. It is no less a duty to ourselves – lest we forget.

We are too near these epic and tragic days rightly to appreciate them. Later on when the blood and mist and tears have all been wiped away and the true perspective appears, then the story of what they have done, how well they did it, and what we owe them for doing it, will appear in its proper and more vivid setting.

And what a moving story it will make in the days that are yet to be. The citizens of tomorrow, looking back over the radiant days of the district, will ponder the record with glowing pride. Their heads will be held high as they read of an Army of 400,000 Australians, 12,000 miles from the theatre of conflict, leaping voluntarily to arms and sailing the seas of the world in defence of King and country. And they will recall with gratitude how these boys fought and suffered and died in the days of old.

Surely it is a happy thought then to make it possible for them as they recount the doughty deeds of the Parramatta boys to see the kind of lighthearted, brave, heroic soldiers who stood comrades and allies in the breach and covered themselves with immortal fame.

When shall their glory fade?



The Treaty of Versailles was the most important of the peace treaties that brought World War One to an end. The Treaty ended the state of war between Germany and the Allied Nations (including Britain, France, Italy, Russia and USA). It was signed on the 28 June 1919 in Versailles, a city 10 miles outside Paris in France.
